ABOUT US

PASADENA PARTNERSHIP

As the lead agency for the Pasadena Continuum of Care, the Pasadena Partnership to End Homelessness coordinates housing, services, and funding for homeless families and individuals. We are dedicated to the planning, promotion, and implementation of evidence-based strategies to effectively prevent and end homelessness in Pasadena. The Pasadena Partnership is one of 400+ U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development-funded continuums of care that plan for and provide, as necessary, a full range of resources to address the various needs of homeless persons. The Pasadena Partnership consists of a board, committees, and representatives at large.

FAITH COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

The Faith Community Committee is a key player in the City's homeless response system and provides a vital voice within the Pasadena Partnership. Our efforts are guided by the shared goal of ending homelessness in Pasadena. Our work centers on facilitating agencies in their efforts to address homelessness in Pasadena. During our monthly meetings we work to forge partnerships within the faith community, facilitate peer learning from providers, and provide a forum for sharing evidence-based best practices and resources available through the Partnership.



PERMANENT HOUSING

We believe that the solution to homelessness is simple: permanent housing. Stable housing is the foundation upon which people build their lives – absent a safe, decent, affordable place to live, it is next to impossible to achieve good health, positive educational outcomes, or reach one's economic potential. Providing immediate access to permanent housing, without preconditions, along with optional supportive services as needed (also called Housing First) can ensure that homeless individuals remain housed, even those with severe substance use and mental health conditions. Under the Housing First service model, emergency shelters and basic services are a pathway to permanent housing, providing temporary shelter and assessment for permanent housing.

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OUR APPROACH TO ENDING HOMELESSNESS

To enact the vision of ending homelessness in Pasadena, faith-based communities are strongly encouraged to align their ministries and programs to support these evidence-based best practices that the federal government has acknowledged as effective in ending homelessness.

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

Permanent Supportive Housing is an intervention for people who are homeless with serious mental illnesses or other disability. These individuals need long-term support to live stably in their communities Informed by the housing first framework, permanent supportive housing is a proven solution for people who have experienced chronic homelessness

RAPID REHOUSING

Rapid Re-Housing is a strategy informed by housing first that quickly re-houses people experiencing homelessness through time-limited financial assistance and targeted supportive services. The goal is to minimize the negative outcomes of homelessness by helping persons return to housing as soon as possible.

TARGETED HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION

Homelessness Prevention programs help to support those who are at-risk of homelessness and ensure they do not become homeless. By targeting assistance to those who are most at-risk of homelessness, programs are able maximize the limited available resources for homelessness prevention.

Since implementing this service model in 2011, Pasadena has seen a 53% decrease in homelessness.

HELP CONNECT PEOPLE TO HOUSING

The Coordinated Entry System streamlines the process of finding housing for those who are homeless by connecting them with all of the housing providers through a single assessment or application. Individuals and families who complete an assessment are connected

with short-term emergency shelter (when needed) and matched with permanent housing, prioritizing those who

Connect with local service providers by creating a list of volunteers who can provide care and continued relationships with families once they are housed. Congregations and faith-based organizations can be connected to local agencies, such as Union Station Homeless Services, Door of Hope, and Imagine LA, through the Faith Community Committee.




START HERE TO END HOMELESSNESS FOR SINGLE ADULTS

Individuals, youth and families who complete an assessment are connected to short-term emergency shelter (when needed) and matched with permanent housing, prioritizing those who are most vulnerable first.



Single adults who are homeless can get help finding permanent housing through the Coordinated Entry System by getting assessed at one of the intake sites below:

The Coordinated Entry System (CES) streamlines the process of finding housing by connecting individuals, youth and families who are homeless with all of the housing providers in the area through a single assessment. Individuals, youth and families who complete an assessment are connected to short-term emergency shelter (when needed) and matched with permanent housing, prioritizing those who are most vulnerable first.



Families who are homeless and in need of permanent housing should call 2-1-1 and request an appointment at a regional Family Solutions Center which is the assessment site for the Coordinated Entry System for families.





A clear TB test & verification of homelessness are required prior to being interviewed for shelter. Help in obtaining a verification letter or a TB test can be provided.

COORDINATED ENTRY SYSTEM (CES)

The Coordinated Entry System (CES) streamlines the process of finding housing by connecting individuals, youth and families who are homeless with all of the housing providers in the area through a single assessment.

CONTINUUM OF CARE (COC)

A Continuum of Care (CoC) is a local planning body that receives federal assistance funds from HUD to coordinate housing and services for homeless families and individuals.
